WNY Turners Club 2 Meeting


A Chapter of the American Association of Woodturners May 9, 2024

<u>Demo</u>

Rick Rosa from club 1 demonstrated two finishing techniques. Thank you Rick!

The first was a sanding agent ... Yorkshire Grit. It comes in two grits, original and microfine. Sand to 320, apply original grit, followed by applying the microfine grit. Finish with friction polish, oil, leave as is. Maybe buff it. Yorkshire Grit also works great with resin (like alumilite)

The second was a CA finish ... To protect your index finger from getting glue on it, cut the fingers off of a cheap latex glove, and for each layer of CA, wear a glove finger. Protect the lathe surface, apply thin CA glue to the piece. Once fully coated (thin layer, don't linger) spray with activator spray. (Someone suggested using a pump spay activator instead – it uses a lot less.) Add about 6 coats. (coat, spray / coat, spray ...) After the final spray, sand using micro-mesh soft touch sanding pads (wet sand) progressing through the grits, course to fine. Once complete, your can use the original and microfine Yorkshire grit as a polisher, followed by Novus #2 Fine Scratch Remover.

Leaving an object with CA finish in water can make the object cloudy, and even peal.

Tips from the AAW OF WOODTURNERS

AAW's Ten Principles of Clean Cutting by Kip Christensen

- 1. Tool Sharpness Sharp tools give clean cuts; dull tools do not.
- 2. Grain Direction The orientation of wood grain in relation to the direction of the cut significantly impacts how wood responds to being cut.
- 3. Bevel Angle and Length A more acute bevel angle on your cutting tool (with a longer bevel) will produce a finer cut than tools with a more obtuse bevel angle (with a shorter bevel).
- 4. Bevel Contact The depth of cut is controlled by gliding the tool's bevel on the wood just behind the cutting edge.
- 5. Cutting Arcs When making curved cuts such as beads and coves, it is necessary to move the tool in three controlled and coordinated arcs to maintain bevel support, control the depth of cut, and create a smooth curve.
- 6. Shavings There are two related principles pertaining to the shavings that come off the wood
 - 1. The quality of the cut is directly related to how little the shavings have to change direction as they leave the workpiece.
 - 2. Shavings must have a clear exit path.
- 7. Tool Clearance There must be clearance for the cutting tool to prevent friction and binding.
- 8. Amount of Cutting Edge Applied Cuts that produce narrow shavings, with less of the cutting edge contacting the wood, produce finer surfaces.
- 9. Feed Rate The faster the feed rate, the rougher the cut will be.
- 10. Tool Stability Holding a cutting tool stable during a cut will produce finer results with less vibration.
